





Highangle rescue teams had abseiled down cliffs to see if Michael had fallen. Divers had looked in rivers and beneath every waterfall. As Misha drove to the meeting point, she thought about how she and Gandalf had only trained for a year with the Search and Rescue Dog 15 Association. She recalled what Dave, her husband, had said as she left the house that morning. "Chances are slim. Don't get your hopes up," he said. Misha had glared at Dave for being negative. "Look, that Boy Scout has been out there for three days. Besides, it's Gandalf's first job. It is just not going to happen," he then 20 defended himself. When Misha arrived, the rescuers told her that the terrain was so rough that they had to go on their hands and knees at times. None of their dogs had found a trail of scent on the ground. Misha sighed. It would be a challenging task for even the keenest animal. 25 At 6 a.m., Misha and other searchers were briefed on every detail about Michael. Misha studied an image of Michael. She wanted to lock it in her mind, the way Gandalf would lock in his scent. Soon, the two of them set off to search. Misha did not want anything negative to cloud her focus. "Michael is alive," she told Gandalf. "We're going to find him." 30 She opened her bag and took out a shred of Michael's clothing which had been given to her by one of the rescue personnel earlier. She let Gandalf sniff it carefully. Head up and nose high, the dog started up the trail. Misha followed. All of a sudden, Misha saw Gandalf's head snap up, but she could not 35 spot a thing in the early morning light. Gandalf ran about 30 metres ahead. Misha saw him quickly lift his head again. Was that the sign she had been waiting for?

Gandalf trotted to the left, out of sight behind a cliff face, and Misha scrambled up the trail behind him. She turned the bend, and there, 50 metres up on a ledge, was a boy in a red jacket, who was dazed from hunger and fatigue.
