The Importance of Plants: Appreciate the greenery around you!



Plants are crucial for life on Earth. They produce oxygen and food, provide habitats for animals, and help regulate the climate. Without plants, we would not be able to survive! However, did you know that plants offer other amazing benefits as well? In this article, you will learn some intriguing facts, and how to make a simple tool to help enrich your understanding of the natural world and its wonders.



Some Benefits of Plants

Plants have been used to make countless things that improve the quality of life. Some plants can be used to make medicine. The bark of a willow tree, for example, contains a natural painkiller called salicylic acid, which is an ingredient in certain medicines and skin products. Oil can be extracted from the seeds of some plants for cooking and other purposes. Many ladies like to apply almond or coconut oil on their hair to make it look glossy. Flowers like jasmine and rose, besides being used as hair accessories, can be used to make perfumes. Many plants can also be used to make dyes for fabrics and even musical instruments. The possibilities are endless!




A Simple Tool


Plants are all around us. The best way to learn about plants is to go outside and explore! By immersing in nature regularly, you can appreciate the beauty of plants, especially the new additions to the neighbourhood. You can also be like a botanist and use a simple tool called a plant press. Botanists use it to flatten and dry the plant specimens they collect, allowing leaves, flowers and other plant parts to be preserved for future study. Each specimen is labelled with collector information, collection location and date, and the plant's name. You can make a simple plant press at home and start your own collection of plant specimens!

How to Make a Plant Press


- 1) Cut pieces of cardboard into squares that are slightly larger than the size of your specimen.
- 2) Cut pieces of paper of the same size as the cardboard squares.



3) Layer the cardboard squares and paper squares in the manner depicted in the diagram.



- the layers of paper, ensuring they are arranged flat and not overlapping.
- 5) Bind the layers together tightly with a string or rubber band, and leave it to dry in a warm, dry place for a few days.



Once your plant press is ready, you can use it to preserve and study all sorts of plants. You might even discover a new species growing in your neighbourhood!

My life began in 1942, amidst the chaos of World War II. My parents, seeking safety for their newborn child, made the fateful decision to have me born in the peaceful city of Oxford, far from the thundering cannons and falling bombs that plagued London then.

Growing up, it was clear that I possessed an unquenchable thirst for knowledge. I dreamed of studying Mathematics at the prestigious Oxford University. Sadly, the course was not offered, so I steered towards Physics, a subject that would soon become my intellectual passion and lifelong pursuit.

Having excelled in my studies, I had high hopes for the future. Unfortunately, fate had a twist in store for me. One seemingly ordinary day, as I descended a staircase, I suddenly could not feel my legs and tumbled. Although I was shaken by the incident, I considered it a brief distraction and told no one about it.

That accident was just the beginning of a bigger and life-changing challenge. Having my once-sharp concentration wane and my speech slur were unsettling. These new symptoms worried me. Determined not to trouble my loved ones, I concealed these symptoms, not knowing how much they would affect me later on. At the age of 21, my deteriorating health finally could no longer escape my father's detection. A visit to the doctor brought forth a crushing diagnosis: Amyotrophic Lateral Sclerosis (ALS), a disease that would rob me of my mobility and, it seemed, my life. The doctor's diagnosis was grim; I had only two years left to live.

Despair washed over me like a suffocating tide. It was in those darkest hours that my father became a beacon of hope. "You can't waste your life away, son. However difficult life may seem, there is always something you can do and succeed at," his words rekindled a spark within me.

Listening to my father, I channeled all my energy into my work and research. I knew that time was a luxury I could not afford, and I refused to waste it. I embarked on a journey fueled by determination to defy the odds. As my body betrayed me and paralysis set in, I found solace in the endless capacity of my mind.

Through the miracles of modern science and medicine, I discovered a means to communicate through a computerised voice system, which breathed new life into my existence. I found innovative ways to think and work. Visualising problems mentally to find solutions contributed to my groundbreaking discoveries – an area of my expertise in science. This ultimately gave me a purpose in life.

As time went by, a lot of people wanted to know how I managed to go beyond the first two years that the doctors had predicted for me. I offered a simple response, "At 21, my expectations dwindled to nothing. Rather than surrendering to the limitations of my condition, I chose to embrace life to its fullest. With that, here I am, 50 years later." Even though my body was limited by ALS, my strong spirit went beyond those limits. Looking back at all that had happened, I realised that my condition proved to be both a blessing and a curse.


