

Siti's eyes widened when she heard this. Her heart was filled with a mix of excitement and fear. The idea of climbing a tall tree in front of everyone terrified her but a part of her longed to overcome her fear. With a deep breath, she made up her mind. "Yes, I will do it," she told Surin resolutely. She had bravely decided to face her fear head-on and participate in the competition.

Over the following weeks, Siti spent hours daily preparing herself to physically climb rock walls and build up her strength. Besides that, she would also take a walk to Central Nature Reserve and imagine herself fearlessly climbing the trees there. She mentally prepared herself through practising deep breathing exercises at home to calm her nerves and whispered positive messages to herself to boost her self-confidence.

The day of the competition arrived and many spectators, including Siti's family and Surin, were gathered at Marina Gardens. They erupted into loud cheers when the announcer read out the competitors' names. As Siti approached the competition site, she realised that the tallest Tembusu tree there had been chosen by the organisers for competitors to climb. Siti's legs became weak as she had not expected it.

Once the competition began, one by one, the competitors climbed the tree, reaching impressive heights. Siti watched with apprehension, her palms growing sweaty. Finally, it was her turn. She took a deep breath, reminding herself of her hours of preparation and the support of her family and good friend. Not wanting to disappoint them, Siti began her ascent after putting on her safety gear.
