Layout of Stalls in the Roof Garden



















The hastily scrawled sign on the crumpled cardboard read: "Broke – Need Dog Food." The desperate young man held the sign in one hand and a leash in the other as he paced back and forth on the busy street. Attached to the leash was a husky dog no more than a year old.

Compelled to help, I turned the car around and made a beeline back towards the duo. For years, I have kept dog and cat food in the trunk of my car for the stray or hungry animals I often find. It has been a way of helping **those** I could not take in. It is also what I have used to coax many scared dogs off the road to safety. Helping needy animals has always been an automatic decision for me.

I pulled into the nearest parking lot and grabbed a bag of dog food, a container of water and a twenty-dollar note from my wallet. I approached the ragged-looking man and his unhappy dog warily.

"Hi. I have some food for your dog," I paused in front of the man and held out the bag of dog food. Indifferent to the gesture, the man opened the bag and poured some dog food on the ground. His dog wagged his tail enthusiastically and sniffed it long enough before licking them off the ground.

"How long have you been out here?" I asked, moments later.

"All day," he replied.

"Hasn't anyone else stopped?" I asked, gazing at the pedestrians passing by.

"No, you're the first," he said. It was late afternoon and quickly getting dark. My mind went into fast-forward as I pictured the two of them going without even a single meal today or for several days. I imagined them spending many long, cold hours cooped up in their inadequate makeshift shelter.

Seeing people beg for food is not anything new in this city. But this man stood out because he was not asking for food for himself. He was more concerned with keeping his dog fed than his own welfare. I do not think I will ever really know what came over me at that moment, inspiring me to do what I did next, but I just knew it was something I had to do. I asked him if he would wait there for a few minutes until I returned. He nodded his head, looking slightly surprised.

My car flew to the nearest grocery store. Bursting with urgency, I raced in and took hold of a cart. I grabbed some essentials — bread, canned food, fruits, dog food and chew toys. When I returned with all the groceries, the corners of the man's mouth turned up in a lopsided grin and his eyes sparkled. He stood up and rushed towards me.

"Here are just a few things..." I passed him the bags. "Good luck to you," I said and held out my hand, which was reciprocated with a slight nod and a thank you.

Later, on my way home, I purposely drove past that same street. The man and his dog were gone, and I knew I had done the right thing. Perhaps I will run into them again someday. I like to think that it all turned out well for them.


